the Cleveland area, performing cello, voice, and piano. As an English major in college, Shannon spent most of her time writing plays for others to perform in, while also taking improv classes at Second



Pramaturg Note

The enduring drama of A RAISIN IN THE SUN lies not merely in the depiction of family dynamics and financial struggles, but how race intersects and interacts with all aspects of the characters' lives. These aspects range from their family, socioeconomic class, romantic relationships, education, and faith, to—indeed—their dreams.

A RAISIN IN THE SUN is a timeless classic because it captures the everyday plight and joy of an American family in the details of historical realism, including the race relations between blacks and whites, the overcrowded living condition of many black families in Southside Chicago, the overpriced "houses for colored," gender norms, and the prevailing frustration of a black working class male who subscribes to the American Dream but finds it unattainable for his race and class. What shines through the adversity and struggle, however, is the resilience of black American men and women and everyday heroism which, like Walter says toward the end of the show, is no abstract causes but inspired by the pursuit of dignity, shelter, and prosperity of the loved ones.

Racial segregation by housing discrimination is a major theme in A RAISIN IN THE SUN. A common misconception of segregation was that it was a body of laws which separated blacks from whites. The reality of the issue was, however, that there wasn't a law to prohibit people from denying others in more vulnerable positions (as renters, the poor, the minority, etc.) because of their race. This was especially the case in northern states where segregation and discrimination was more so a matter of fact rather than law. The permission of discrimination was a tangible manifestation of racism that Hansberry personally experienced as a black Chicago native in the 1930s. The Hansberry family's own experience of being racially profiled and consequently barred from housing in Chicago directly inspired A RAISIN IN THE SUN and grounded Hansberry's political and social insights.

No individual, no matter how kind or disciplined, is immune to our shared racial history. To challenge racism, we must commit to dismantle the economic, social, and political structures that perpetuate it. I hope that our production of this American classic illustrates some of the ways in which racism manifests, and inspires audience to that deeper commitment—to, on the parts of all races, confront racism as it manifests in personal relationships, on the ballots or on a report card, through housing investment or how work-places are organized, and actively struggle with it.
